Writing to your Parliamentary Representatives

The more letters that Federal, state and territory MPs and Senators receive about ACRRM's key policy priorities, the more likely they are to recognise that these are issues which governments needs to address.

A short, signed personal letter can have real impact, especially if you are referencing a specific inadequacy in the health system.

• Use the correct title

- For MPs use Mr/Mrs/Ms/Dr First Name Last Name MP
- For Senators use Senator First Name Last Name
- For MPs and Senators who are or have been government Ministers, use
 - → The Hon. First Name Last Name MP
 - → Senator the Hon. First Name Last Name
- Include your name and address
- Introduce yourself and your issue/s
- **Personalise the letter**—tell your own story by using your own words
- Tell them what you want them to do to make the healthcare system better for you and your community
- Use polite and respectful language
- Keep it brief—one page will have maximum impact.

Suggested Facts and Figures:
